



2. Robert and Cyndi Boston Home (Fuller-Faver-Boston Home) 65 Spring Street

The Newnan Herald reported on November 27, 1883 that, *“Mr. J. G. Fuller has purchased from Mr. J. R. Wilkinson the valuable lot on Spring Street formerly occupied by him and has made a contract with Messrs R. D. Cole & Co. for the erection of a nice residence on the same.”*

In 1903 the home was sold to Mr. Samuel Lumpkin Faver. According to The Herald and Advertiser on May 22, 1903, *“Mr. S. L. Faver, who recently bought the Fuller house on Spring street, will add another story to the building.”* The Bostons (the current owners) found telltale signs under the present staircase that the staircase originally went in the opposite direction.

Mr. Faver died in December, 1903. At that time, he had served as Clerk of the Superior Court for six years. Mr. Faver was only 57 at the time of his death and was survived by his wife and five children. A fund was set up to raise money to erect a monument in Mr. Faver’s memory. The monument adorns the family plot in Oak Hill Cemetery.

In January, 1903 Mr. Faver’s daughters, Pauline Faver Camp and Kate Faver, were two of the seventeen founding members of the “Sarah Dickerson Chapter” of the Daughters of the American Revolution.
